Message from the Office of General Counsel

The Office of the General Counsel (OGC) is pleased to present its annual legislative report covering the 2025 Session of the Maryland General Assembly (MGA). The MGA is the legislative branch of the Maryland state government. This legislative report includes summaries of legislation regarding major issues, state and local government, environment and transportation, Legislative Bond Initiatives (LBIs aka Bond Bills) and state budget. Proposed bills for this session originated from a variety of sources including constituents, government agencies, special interest groups and lobbyists. This year, as in most legislative sessions, several bills were reintroduced from previous years before. The most relevant previously introduced bills have been identified within this report.

As we look back on the 90-day session, we give a special thanks to Maryland- National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC or "the Commission") Commissioners, Directors, and Department staff who helped educate the general assembly members on our legislative priorities. We thank our stakeholders and local elected officials for giving us the time and platform to inform members on critical legislation involving housing, solar, land use and economic development, and the potential impacts on both Prince George's and Montgomery Counties.


As always, we look forward to collaborating with you in the interim and again during the next legislative session.

Introduction

The MGA celebrated its 447th session this year, and by law, the Maryland legislature is required to meet in Regular Session for 90 calendar days each year in Annapolis. The 2025 legislative session commenced on Wednesday, January 8, 2025, and concluded on Monday, April 7, 2025. The House of Delegates introduced 1558 House bills, 336 LBIs and seven Joint Resolutions (JR). The Senate introduced 1047 Senate bills, 328 LBIs and five JR. A total of 878 bills were passed by both chambers.



This year, 2025, is the third year of Governor, Wes Moore and Lieutenant Governor, Aruna Miller's administration. The Moore-Miller administration's top priorities this year were to stimulate the State's economic growth through the <u>Housing for Jobs Act</u> and protect federal workers in the event of a catastrophic event or federal government shutdown through the <u>Protect our Federal Workers Act</u>. Due to concurrent events at the national level, jobs and the federal workforce were the most heavily discussed topics during this session and gained widespread media coverage. To expand opportunities for employers and apprentices, the administration passed the <u>RAISE Act</u> which establishes the Maryland Office of Registered Apprenticeship Development and alters the duties of the Maryland Apprenticeship and Training Council.

Section I: Budget, Bond Bills, Grant Funding and Fiscal Impacts

Like previous legislative sessions, the Moore-Miller administration made strides to balance the state budget. However, this legislative year had some challenges as the state started out with a \$3 Billion projected deficit. After extensive negotiation, the House and Senate successfully passed a \$67 Billion spending plan which includes budget spending reductions, cost shifts, fund transfers and revenue enhancements to balance the fiscal year 2026 budget.



The MGA passed <u>HB 350 Budget Bill</u> which is the state operating budget appropriations for fiscal 2026. The MGA also passed the state capital budget <u>HB 351 Creation of a State Debt – Maryland Consolidated</u> <u>Bond Loan of 2025</u> in the amount of \$1,814,825,000. <u>HB 352 Budget Reconciliation Financing Act</u> passed and reduced millions of dollars of general fund spending. As well as <u>HB 1519 Prior Authorization of State</u> <u>Debt – Alternations</u> which amends certain prior authorizations of state debt to adjust the names of certain grantees, alter the authorized uses of certain grants, and extend termination dates of certain grants. Legislative Bond Initiatives

Legislative Bond Initiatives - LBIs are bond authorization requests filed by members of the MGA to support specific local or non-State-owned capital projects. The Commission received a total of \$6,458,000 in LBIs and grants this legislative session. Below are a photos of Commission-owned properties that received funding this legislative session. Program Open Space

Program Open Space (POS) –Provides financial and technical assistance to local subdivisions for planning, acquisition, and/ or development of land for recreation and open space. POS is a partnership between the Counties in Maryland and the Department of Natural Resources to provide open space, natural resources, and outdoor recreational opportunities for Prince George's County and Montgomery County residents. A total of **\$35,472,393** was provided to twenty-four counties in the state of Maryland. The Department of Natural Resources allotted the Commission a total of **\$8,386,360 combined in both Prince George's and Montgomery Counties** in program open space funds this legislative session. Fiscal Notes

Fiscal Notes – In Maryland, a committee may not vote on a bill unless a fiscal note accompanies the bill. A fiscal note for a bill must contain an estimate of the fiscal impact of the bill on the revenue and expenditure of the state government and of local governments. The Maryland Department of Legislative Services (DLS) is responsible for providing written estimates of the fiscal impact on state and local government finances for all proposed bills. By law, organizations are required to respond to fiscal note impact requests from DLS. Jordan Baucum Colbert, Government Affairs Liaison leads the Commission's fiscal note impact group weekly meeting during the 90-day session. Members of the fiscal note group represent various departments throughout the Commission (Parks, Planning, Finance, Legal, and Human Resources, etc.). This year, the fiscal note group reviewed over forty fiscal note requests. A *brief summary* of representative fiscal note responses the Commission provided are indicated below.

Section II: Selective Statewide Legislative Highlights

Below is a snapshot of legislation that passed with potential or actual impacts on the Commission's operations and business processes. A few bills have been highlighted for informational purposes only.

Economic Development



<u>HB 1424/ SB 0683 Catastrophic Event Account and, Federal Government Shutdown Employee</u> <u>Assistance Loan Fund, and Powers of the Attorney General – Alterations (Protect Our Federal Workers</u> <u>Act)</u>

Two months into the new presidential administration federal workers experienced mass layoffs initially aimed at probationary employees to promote plans for reduction in the federal workforce. In addition to layoffs, federal agencies experienced hiring freezes and closures of entire federal government departments as part of the Department of Government Efficiency's (DOGE) plan to significantly downsize the federal government. To assist with funding costs in connection with a closure, relocation, or mass layoff of a unit of the federal government, or similar circumstances Delegate Jazz Lewis successfully championed the <u>Protect Our Federal Workers Act (HB 1424)</u>. Among other things, the proposed bill renames the Federal Government Shutdown Employee Assistance Loan Fund to be the Federal Government Employee Assistance Loan Fund and authorize funds appropriated to the Catastrophic Event Account. **The House version of this bill passed.**

Energy and Climate



HB 1036/SB 0931 Public Utilities - Generating Stations - Generation and Siting (Renewable Energy Certainty <u>Act)</u>

Among other things, this bill establishes a distributed generation certificate of public convenience and necessity to authorize the construction and operation of a distributed solar energy generating system. It requires the Power Plant Research Program, by July 1, 2026, to develop and submit to the Commission proposed siting and design requirements and licensing conditions. It establishes development standards and requirements for the construction of solar energy generating stations or front–of–the–meter energy storage devices. This bill also prohibits a local jurisdiction from adopting laws or regulations or denying site development plans and requires local governments to expedite the review and approval of solar site development plans. On or before July 1, 2026, the Public Service Commission shall report to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly on the results of the study. **Both the House and Senate versions of this bill passed.**

Land Use, Zoning and Planning

HB 503/ SB 430 Housing Development Act

The original version of this bill sought to require the Department of Housing and Community Development and the Department of Planning to calculate regional housing infrastructure gaps. The bill was amended several times during the 90-day session and ultimately revised to periodically establish housing production targets for the State and certain local jurisdictions. The Commission worked closely with the Moore-Miller administration and Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) to support legislation that would help the state meet its housing goals. **This bill did not pass.**

Government Operations

HB 752 Commission on State and Local Government Real Property Bearing Confederate Names

This bill was previously introduced in 2024. As reintroduced under a new sponsor, Delegate Matthew J. Schindler, this bill sought to establish the Commission on State and Local Government Real Property Bearing Confederate Names. Due to the Montgomery Planning Department's experience with street renaming efforts and Prince George's Planning Department's experience in conducting research related to street naming, the Commission voted to support this bill. Matthew Mills, Senior Counsel and Jordan Baucum Colbert, Government Affairs Liaison were invited by the bill sponsor to testify in person as panelists before the Health and Government Affairs Committee. **For the second year in a row, this bill did not pass.**

Health and Safety

HB 176/ SB 0026 - Davis Martinez Public Employee Safety and Health Act

This bill provides for development and adoption of occupational safety and health standards, including standards in the workplace. This bill aims to make the workplace of public bodies safer and healthier by requiring public bodies to create or improve programs and plans related to workplace violence. It requires that the workplace of public bodies be inspected regularly and maintained so that employees are provided with a place of employment that is safe, healthy and productive over the occurrences of their careers. This bill was later amended to require the Correctional Training Commission to adopt certain regulations for training, issuance, and use of body-worn cameras. **Both the House and Senate versions of this bill passed.**

HB 1163 Task Force to Study Fencing for Bodies of Water and Playgrounds - Established

This bill proposed to establish a Task Force to Study Fencing for Bodies of Water and Playgrounds. After reviewing this bill, the Commission believed its participation would add value to the task force membership as the Commission owns and operates playgrounds and parkland in both Prince George's and Montgomery Counties. The Commission requested that the bill sponsor, Delegate Edith H. Patterson, add both park departments to the taskforce membership list. The proposed amendments were adopted. In addition to fencing, the Commission encouraged the task force to also consider other safety features and/or interventions to prevent injuries and fatalities. The Commission

submitted a written statement to support this bill with amendments. This bill did not pass.

Capital Budget and Appropriations

HB 1078 / SB 997 Prince George's County - Federal Bureau of Investigation Headquarters - Mandated Appropriation

The new Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Headquarters was slated to bring in 7,500 new jobs and 4 billion over economic activities. Securing funds for future redevelopment and improvements was vital and would help ensure investments in the state of Maryland. This bill indicated that if the U.S. General Services Administration applies to Prince George's County or the State of for a permit associated with the relocation of the FBI Headquarters to Prince George's County, the Governor shall include in the annual operating or capital budget bill an appropriation of at least \$200,000,0000 for site development and to improve transportation infrastructure for the FBI Headquarters relocation project. **The House version of this bill passed.**

HB 717 Natural Resources – Public Lands – Acquisition, Staffing, Operations and Funding

This bill alters the provisions of law regarding the Department's acquisition of real property by the Department of Natural Resources. It creates sustainable funding sources to protect public lands and authorizes the department to have affiliate foundations and create partnerships for Maryland residents. It aims to work with local governments to support development in local communities. Among other things, this bill also establishes a Land and Property Management Program in DNR to process certain real property transactions. **This bill passed.**

Energy and Environment

SB 250 Department of the Environment - Fees, Penalties, Funding, and Regulation

This bill was previously introduced in 2024. This bill alters the authorized use of the Maryland Clean Air Fund to include certain activities relating to mitigating and reducing air pollution in the State. It specifies that money deposited into the Maryland Clean Air Fund may not revert to the General Fund of State. It alters the maximum amount of the air quality control permit fee. Additionally, this bill establishes a new dam safety permit fee for constructing, reconstructing, repairing, removing, or modifying a dam and a new dam annual registration fee. Beginning July 1, 2027, to register with the department, a dam owner must comply with these dam fees and registration requirements. **This bill passed.**

Section III: Bi-County Legislative Highlights

This section features selected highlights of various Bi-County bills in which the Commission either voted to support or oppose, submitted a written statement, or engaged bill sponsors and stakeholders on the bill. A full list of bills can be found in section 6 of this report.

HB 1064 Montgomery County Planning Board and Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission – Open Meetings – Live Streaming Requirement (MC/ 101-25)

Due to technical challenges with mobile streaming and the existing statutory requirement to stream meetings, the Montgomery County Planning Board were required to conduct several sessions of any tour or site visit related to master plans and parks, in an effort to avoid a quorum. This required six or more planning staff for at least three to four hours each tour, numerous vehicle trips, coordination for access to specific sites to educate the Planning Board members about a master plan area or park facility. The Commission, Chair, Artie Harris and planning staff introduced the bill idea to the Montgomery County Delegation Chair, Julie Palakovich Carr.

As written, HB 1064, establishes that certain project site visits and educational field tours do not constitute open meetings subject to the requirement that the Montgomery County Planning Board and the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission, respectively, stream live video or audio of their open meetings. Chair Artie Harris, testified before the Montgomery County Delegation bill hearing. With the help of Delegate Julie Palakovich Carr, the Montgomery County Delegation and staff, **the bill passed. The effective date is July 1, 2025.**

HB 964 Montgomery County – Task Force on the Displacement of Residents of Emory Grove (MC 5-25)

Emory Grove was originally founded by freed African Americans in 1864. For more than 100 years, Emory Grove represented a thriving close-knit African American community in the Montgomery County. As a result of Urban Renewal in the 1960's and 1970's many residents were left displaced. To identify how urban renewal caused the displacement of residents, Delegate Charlotte Crutchfield introduced HB 964, which establishes the task force on the Displacement of Residents of Emory Grove. The task force will be staffed by the Montgomery County Office of Human Rights to study how the urban renewal program carried out from 1960 through 1985 that caused the displacement of residents of Emory Grove. If deemed appropriate by the task force, it will recommend remedies for past inequities in the purchase of land by Montgomery County through the urban renewal program in Emory Grove. As indicated in the bill, **the task force must hold its first meeting no later than July 1, 2025.** The task force must submit an interim report of its findings and recommendations to the Montgomery County Council, the Montgomery County Executive, and the Montgomery County delegation to the General Assembly by December 15, 2025, and a final report by December 15, 2026. The Commission voted to support this bill with amendments to add the "Montgomery Planning Board Chair or his designee" as a task force member. The proposed amendments were adopted. Jordan Baucum Colbert, Government Affairs Liaison testified in support of this bill and a written position statement was submitted on behalf of the Commission. **This bill passed**.

HB 1266 Taskforce on Land Use Issues in Prince George's County (MC/ PG 117-25)

This bill was previously introduced in 2024. As reintroduced this year by the same bill sponsor, Delegate Tiffany Alston, the original version of this bill sought to remove all approval authority of the Prince George's County Planning Board and the Board of Appeals and give exclusive approval authority to Prince George's County District Council. Approval of all development plans, subdivision plans, tree conservation plans, variances, appeals, etc. would fall under the authority of Prince George's County District Council. The Commission voted to oppose the original version of this bill and submitted a written position statement in opposition. However, during the 90-day session the Prince George's County delegation heavily amended this bill removing the transfer of authority and instead creating a taskforce to study land use issues in Prince George's County. **This bill did not pass.**

SB 832 Prince George's County – District Council Zoning Laws – Override by Municipal Corporation

This bill sought to authorize a municipal corporation in Prince George's County in the regional district to override zoning laws made by the district council and by a majority vote of the governing body of the municipal corporation. This would have allowed all 27 municipalities in Prince George's County to "override" any provision of the County's 700+ page zoning ordinance which would cause uncertainty in the county's development and permitting process. The Commission voted to oppose this bill. A written position statement was submitted on behalf of the Counties.

HB 1231 Montgomery County and Prince George's County Qualifying Municipal Corporation Land Use (MC/PG 114-25)

This bill was previously introduced in 2024. As reintroduced by the same bill sponsor, Delegate Marvin Holmes, the original language of this bill authorized qualifying municipalities with at least 15,000 residents to exercise zoning and subdivision authority utilizing the <u>same</u> zoning code and regulations as the County. During the 90-day session, the bill sponsor amended the bill to add subdivision authority to the powers granted to qualifying municipalities. The proposed amendment also altered "qualifying municipality" to be defined as a municipality of any size which employs a single planner. The Commission voted to oppose this bill. A written position statement was submitted on behalf of the Commission. Jordan Baucum Colbert, Government Affairs Liaison offered testimony on behalf of the Commission during the Prince George's County delegation bill hearing. **This bill did not pass.**

HB 1167 – Montgomery County - Municipal Authority to Regulate Structures - Alterations MC/PG 116-25

This bill applies to municipalities in Montgomery County over which the Commission has planning and zoning authority (i.e., Takoma Park, Kensington, Garrett Park, Somerset, Glen Echo, Martin's Addition, Town of Chevy Chase, Chevy Chase View, Chevy Chase Village, Village of Chevy Chase, Section 3, and Village of Chevy Chase, Section 5). The bill is intended to allow municipalities to impose additional or stricter building requirements that are required by county zoning on residential buildings with four or fewer dwelling units and their accessory structures without regard to the zoning for the land where the building is located. Montgomery Planning Director, Jason Sartori worked closely with the municipalities and the bill sponsor, Delegate Jared Solomon, to identify key components of this legislation that would align with the County's goals. The Commission voted to support this bill. **This bill passed.**

HB 1228 Department of Commerce – Montgomery County Agricultural Reserve Study

Montgomery County's Agricultural Reserve represents one-third of the total land area in Montgomery County. Regular monitoring and studying of this area is critical to ensure that it maintains economic viability. This bill requires the Maryland Department of Commerce, in coordination with certain county agencies and organizations, to study economic development and the tourist and visitor economy of the Montgomery County Agricultural Reserve. On or before June 30, 2026, findings must be reported to the members of the Montgomery County Delegation to the General Assembly. Commission staff have offered to share data and/or other available resources for this study. The Commission voted to support this bill. A written position statement was submitted on behalf of the Commission. **This bill passed.**

HB 1466/ SB 0089 Land use and Real Property - Accessory Dwelling Units - Requirements and Prohibitions

This bill requires, on or before October 1, 2026, each legislative body to adopt a local law authorizing the development of accessory dwelling units subject to certain requirements to meet housing needs. This bill also indicates that a local law adopted under this law shall exclude the development of an accessory dwelling unit from calculation of density and the application of any measures limiting residential growth that pertain to the lot, parcel, or tract proposed for the development of the accessory dwelling unit. To align the bill more closely with local goals for housing, the Commission proposed amendments that were accepted by the sponsor of this bill, Delegate Vaughn Stewart. The Commission voted to support this bill with amendments and a written position statement was submitted. **Both the House and Senate versions of this bill passed.**

<u>HB 1470 – Prince George's County - Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays Critical Area Protection Program</u> - <u>Cutting or Clearing Trees MC/PG 113-25</u>

This bill is applicable only in Prince George's County. The bill indicates that in order to enforce a violation involving the clearing or cutting of trees in the Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays Critical Area (CBCA), the Prince George's County Department of Permitting, Inspections, and Enforcement must record a lien on property that is the subject of the violation. The bill further establishes limits, prohibitions, requirements, and authorizations on actions the local jurisdiction may take if a lien is not recorded as required by the Act.

It also requires Prince George's County government to vacate administrative enforcement actions related to a violation occurring on or before November 7, 2018, where the current property owner purchased the property in good faith after the previous owner's violation, and Prince George's County to reimburse the current property owner for all costs and fees associated with such enforcement actions. The Commission did not take an official vote on this bill. However, staff submitted a written informational statement to clarify that M-NCPPC has no enforcement authority in Prince George's County and has no control over fines levied for violations of the CBCA Act. This bill was amended to remove M-NCPPC from the bill. **This bill passed. The effective date is October 1, 2025.**


Section IV: Montgomery Parks and Planning Department Montgomery County Delegation Annual Briefing
